GOD IS STILL PRESENT

A Message from Pastor Bill Davis

The master of the banquet tasted the water that had been turned into wine. He did not realize where it had come from, though the servants who had drawn the water knew. Then he called the bridegroom aside and said, "... you have saved the best till now." What Jesus did here in Cana of Galilee was the first of the signs through which he revealed his glory.

John 2:9-11a

Over the past year, an epidemic of scams has swept through our country. The Peninsula-Delaware Conference has alerted our churches to let parishioners know that neither our bishop nor any other legitimate Methodist organization or church will solicit funds through private emails or automated phone calls. Conley's was not spared as emails and phone calls were sent out in our church's name in an attempt to steal money from unsuspecting victims. Again, please be alert to such activity.

While modern technology has afforded new opportunities for thieves to exploit, the existence of scams is nothing new. In 1916, an inventor named Louis Enricht claimed to have developed an additive that would transform ordinary water into a gasoline substitute. Enricht claimed that his invention would reduce the per-gallon cost of fuel to a single penny. At a press conference, Enricht asked reporters to bring him a bucket of tap water; he then stirred in a small amount of his additive, and invited everyone to test the mixture in their own vehicles. It worked! But not for long. Enricht had merely discovered that if you add acetone to water, the mixture will, indeed, run an engine...and then destroy it. Before the destructive effects could be seen, Enricht had managed to collect millions of dollars for his worthless "invention"—even from such experts as Henry Ford. In the end, Enricht's transformation of ordinary water demonstrated nothing more than the greedy nature of humanity.

In the passage above, Jesus used a transformation of ordinary water to demonstrate the glorious nature of God (I encourage you to read the entire story in John 2:1-11). At a wedding celebration, Jesus transformed water into wine. Not just any wine, mind you, but the very best. Most of the people at the celebration were too busy to see the miracle; only a handful of servants and disciples recognized the presence of the Divine in their midst.

It's hard to believe that August and September have passed, and now we're at the beginning of fall. We stand around scratching our heads, wondering where the time has gone. This year has really flown by.



ODYSSEA: A SPIRITUAL JOURNEY

A Call to Faith by Experience

"I will raise up for myself a faithful priest, who will do according to what is in my heart and mind. I will firmly establish his priestly house, and they will minister before my anointed one always." (1 Samuel 2:35 NIV)

We all come to faith in many different ways, and John Wesley, the leader of the Methodist movement, understood that. "Wesley believed that the living core of the Christian faith was revealed in Scripture, illumined by tradition, vivified in personal experience, and confirmed by reason." This methodology, referred to as the "Wesleyan Way," was based upon these four criteria. The term "Wesleyan

Quadrilateral" was later coined by Albert C. Outler, a 20th-century American Methodist scholar. I am a Methodist because of *personal experience*.

My story of faith began with an extraordinary experience when I was seven years old. After he retired from the U.S Army, my dad was accepted to the Washington, D.C. Police Academy, so we moved to D.C. to live with my Greek maternal grandparents until he graduated. I started going to church on Sunday with my grandmother at the Sts. Constantine & Helen Greek Orthodox Church, and it was there that I first heard about Jesus. My first experience of entering that church was amazing—the grand Byzantine architecture, the blue dome adorned with gold leaf, and the beautiful painted icons. Once my grandmother's best friend found out I hadn't been baptized, she offered to become my godmother and sponsored me for baptism. So at age seven, I was baptized in the traditional immersion ceremony with my family and friends as witnesses. What made my baptism experience extraordinary? Unlike infant baptisms, I made the choice to follow Jesus, and I remember everything about my baptism.

I embraced the Orthodox beliefs and traditions that set the tone for my family, but I chose to leave the church after my grandmother passed while I was in college. When I moved to Baltimore in 1995, I suddenly felt the nudge to look for a new church home. I thought it would be best to "go back to my roots" and worship in a familiar tradition, so I chose the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Cathedral located downtown, but I quickly realized I didn't feel "at home" there. A friend told me about a church a few blocks from Annunciation that was welcoming and sponsored many community outreach ministries which piqued my interest.

On a warm Sunday morning in August 1995, I walked up the steps of the Mount Vernon Place UMC for the first time, and when the pastor greeted me, he said, "Welcome, we've been waiting for you." I walked into the sanctuary and knew instantly I had been led to my new church home. It was there that I learned to serve in a soup kitchen ministry (Carpenter's Kitchen), published my first church newsletter ("The Flame"), and started writing about a journey of faith ("Odyssea"). Those experiences

formed the foundation of my call to faith as a Methodist.

From that experience at Mount Vernon Place, through the years and three other churches since then, to the first time I worshipped at Conley's in 2019, it has been my experiences that strengthened my faith and kindled my dedication to being a Methodist. We are all affected by our life experiences—both the good and bad. Our experiences help us mature as human beings and grow into the person God intends us to become. It's important to recognize that our spiritual experiences enrich us individually and as a community of faith.

Key Pillars of Faith Descriptions

- **1. Scripture**: The first and primary authority; it contains the <u>only</u> measure whereby all other truth can be
- 2. Tradition: Don't undervalue the witness of development and growth of the faith through the past centuries and in many nations and cultures.
- **3. Experience**: Apart from scripture, experience is the strongest proof of Christianity for each person. For example, "One thing I know: I was blind but now I see!"
- 4. Reason: Without reason we cannot understand the essential truth of Scripture as long as we are assisted, of course, by the Holy Spirit.
